Sir Jeffrey Jowell combines an active practice of unusual variety with a distinguished academic career. In October 2010 Jeffrey became the inaugural Director of the Bingham Centre on the Rule of Law, created after the retirement of Lord Bingham. Jeffrey's practice continued during that time and he returned to full-time practice in October 2015.

Sir Jeffrey is recommended by Legal 500 2017 in the Public International Law area, "Outstanding – an absolute star," and Legal 500 2015, "his written and oral advocacy is beautifully crafted – he is a tremendous authority," also in Legal 500 2014, 'he has a very strong public international law dimension to his practice.' In Legal 500 2013 it was noted he had "incredible gravitas and authority," and Legal 500 2012 described him as having an "enviable reputation". In the 2011 edition it was reported that "Sir Jeffrey Jowell KCMG QC's expertise in the area was reflected when he was knighted (KCMG) for services to democracy, human rights and the rule of law in Europe."

The Times Law 100 2012 - Jeffrey is featured in The Times' list of the 100 most influential lawyers. He was listed in The Times newspaper's inaugural 'Law 100: the UK's most powerful lawyers' list, where he was described as "a leading authority on public, constitutional and administrative law".

The scope of Sir Jeffrey's work includes judicial review, human rights and other aspects of public and international law. He advises extensively on the drafting of national constitutions, the relationship between the UK and dependent territories, and the design and application of internal regulatory and Ombudsmen schemes. He has appeared on these matters in the courts of Commonwealth countries as well as the Privy Council and the UK Supreme Court.

His advice is enhanced by the practical experience he gained through his role (between 2000–2011) as the UK's member of the Council of Europe's Commission for Democracy through Law ("The Venice Commission") where he assisted with the constitutional and public law of a number of countries. Through his work with the Bingham Centre he also provides extensive advice on rule of law standards internationally.

He has held public office such as Member of the Royal Commission on Environmental Pollution; Non-Executive Director of the Office of Rail Regulation ('ORR') and Chair of the Ombudsman Committee of British Waterways (later the Canal and Rivers Trust). He is a member of the Foreign Secretary's Advisory Committee on Human Rights and is a trustee of various foundations in the UK and abroad.

Sir Jeffrey is Professor Emeritus of Public Law at University College London where he was Dean of the Law Faculty and a Vice Provost. His authority as an academic commentator is reflected in many citations to his work in the judgments of courts in this country and abroad. His many publications include the standard text on Judicial Review (with Lord Woolf et al): de Smith's Judicial Review (8th ed. 2018) and (with Professor Colm O'Connell), The Changing Constitution (9th ed. 2019).

He is a Bencher of the Middle Temple and has been awarded a number of honorary degrees and awards including Hon. Fellow of UCL, Hon. Fellow of Hertford College Oxford and Honorary Doctorates from the Universities of Cape Town, Athens and Paris.

Sir Jeffrey is an accredited CEDR Mediator.

Sir Jeffrey has recently been elected a Fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. He will be formally inducted in October 2020.

## EXPERIENCE

### Public & Regulatory

Sir Jeffrey is instructed by private and government solicitors in the UK and abroad, and by international organisations on issues of constitutional, administrative and human rights law. Over the past two years, he has assisted on the constitutions of the Cayman Islands, Gibraltar, Burma, Sri Lanka and Georgia. He has acted as an expert witness in the recent extradition case of The Government of the Republic of Turkey v Buyuk, Celik and Ipek, in which he was described as an "authoritative and persuasive witness". He regularly advises on public law matters in British Overseas Territories and Crown Dependencies. He has been involved in the constitutional settlements of Serbia, Bosnia, the Maldives and Luxembourg. He has appeared in the courts of a number of countries including Malawi, the Cayman Islands and Bermuda. He assisted with the South African constitution and its administrative law statute. He appeared in the recent Supreme Court case, R (Privacy International) v Investigatory Powers Tribunal and will be appearing in a human rights case before the court of Grand Cayman.

### Cases

#### **John Hewitt v Tara Rivers & Attorney General of the Cayman Islands**

Grand Court (Cause No. 198 of 2013)

In 2013, he appeared successfully in this case which is likely to stand as a major authority on electoral law in Commonwealth jurisdictions and on constitutional interpretation generally.

He has also developed an impressive portfolio of constitutional work for national governments abroad and he is well known for his strong diplomatic skills in this field.

## Rule of Law

Sir Jeffrey has been involved in practical rule of law projects in many different ways. He was the founder-director of the Bingham Centre for the Rule of Law ( a London-based international body ); and the UK Member of the Council of Europe's Commission for Democracy Through Law (the 'Venice Commission', which provides advice to countries in Europe and beyond on rule of law issues). He has advised a number of countries on their constitutions, on their law-making, electoral, law-enforcement and regulatory systems and on techniques to ensure access to justice, rights and judicial independence. He is a leading authority on administrative law, including the necessary powers of the state and ways to ensure good and lawful governance.

## Public International Law

Sir Jeffrey has advised and litigated in many countries on different issues concerning constitutional and international human rights standards. He has represented a number of Commonwealth countries and British Overseas Territories and Dependencies on their relative powers and constitutional duties. He has recently appeared in the courts of countries in the Caribbean on such matters, and in the Privy Council and the UK Supreme Court.

## Offshore

Sir Jeffrey has worked on different issues offshore for countries, attorneys-general and civil society. His work includes litigation on public law matters in places such as Bermuda, the Cayman Islands, Malawi, the Southern African Development Community's Tribunal in Namibia and related litigation in the Privy Council and House of Lords. For many years he has been the constitutional advisor to the Cayman Islands, and in 2018 both advised in respect of the Sanctions and Money-Laundering Act and assisted in their constitutional negotiations with the FCO. He has similarly advised the Governments of Gibraltar, Jersey and Guernsey on their relationship with the United Kingdom. He has advised on matters such as the relationship on the compatibility of measures to combat tax evasion in the Overseas Territories with human rights to privacy. He has recently advised on the new Georgian constitution and Sri Lankan constitutions. Previous work includes advice on public law and human rights issues in Singapore, Malaysia, the Maldives and South Africa.
